
GREAT YEAR FOR STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENTS

For years, KMBC has had a dream of creating more scholarship endowment funds to help needy and deserving students. Twenty-five years ago the school had about 5 named scholarships, totaling less than \$90,000. Now the college has 68! This year, 7 new named scholarships were created. In addition to adding 7 new scholarships, gifts were given to increase 35 of the existing scholarship funds. It is thrilling to know that so many people have a passion to see the scholarship funds grow. A total of \$262,967.77 new money was added to our scholarship funds by our friends in the past 12 months. KMBC wishes to thank all who have established an endowed student scholarship fund at KMBC. About 75% of our students receive some scholarship assistance. We would love to see the amount of scholarship assistance grow. To reach our goal we need to double the amount we currently have.

LIBRARY TOPS 40,000 VOLUMES

Early this summer KMBC's library crossed the 40,000

volume mark! For a school our size we have a very impressive library. A previous accrediting evaluation team member told the college that he had evaluated between 40 - 50 Bible college libraries. He said that ours was one of the best he had ever seen! In addition to our large book collection. our students have access to hundreds of magazines through the internet. We also provide Logos Bible Software for our students, as they progress through school. KMBC wishes to congratulate our library staff for providing such top quality services to our students.



WHY I BELIEVE IN KMBC

I believe in KMBC because the college teaches its students how to act as professionals when it is appropriate. The college is in the process of completely renovating the 3500 square foot ground floor of Brengle Hall. The plan is to turn this space into a beautiful complex for visitors and campus guests. This will meet our steadily growing need for guest housing. We have made good

progress on the project. The work is about half done. This summer, an appeal was sent out to raise \$50,000 to finish the project. \$36,729 has been given in response. That means we need about \$13,729 to finish the project. We hope to have the project finished by spring of

A charitable gift annuity is a contract between you and the college whereby you give a set sum of money and the college guarantees to give you a fixed rate of interest as long as you live. The principal becomes the property of the college upon your death. The advantage of a charitable gift annuity is that you get a much higher rate of return while you live and upon your death you leave a generous gift to help support the college. A portion of the charitable gift annuity is tax deductible at the time of purchase. A portion of the annual income is also tax deductible. This summer several KMBC students and staff did missions work in eight different countries. They worked in the Dominican Republic, Costa Rica, Haiti, Papua New Guinea, Thailand, Hong Kong, and two closed countries. Their ministries included teaching, garbage cleanup, helping with early child care products for needy mothers, evangelizing, preaching, passing out tracts, witnessing, and smuggling Bibles into a closed country. Born in Romania, Johnny came to the states, and Kentucky in particular, when he was four. He attended public school, and while on the way home from church with his family one Sunday a song on Christian radio convicted him that he was not ready to stand before God. When he got home he related his concern to his mother and she helped him to find Christ as Savior. The family began attending a Nazarene church in Lexington, and Johnny (a sophomore then) attended their summer youth camp, hosted at KMBC. He hadn't heard anything about KMBC, but said as soon as he stepped on campus God made him acutely aware that KMBC was where he was to attend college. The following summer at his church's camp (on the KMBC campus) he sensed God awakening him to the fact that it was time he got serious with God and surrender everything to Him. Johnny went forward and knelt to pray, and stayed praying until he had the confidence that God had done the work and sanctified him wholly.

One thing that stands out to him in these early weeks of school is the range of opportunities available to serve. He also commented on the atmosphere all over campus, the dorm, classrooms, dining hall ... everyone seems to be united, focused on God and doing His will.
